Content and Sequencing



- Artists from various cultures, countries and art movements are studied during all Art year groups
- Plants. Animals, people, landscape, nature, natural materials, cells, sea and much more are all Natural Forms, these are studied in relation to Artists work in these areas. Students develop their initial research and sketches into final pieces of Art work
- Natural and man-made surfaces as inspiration for Art projects are
 plentiful, from the surface of the Earth and Sea to making surface texture
 in Ceramics and Printmaking collages. Concepts such as smooth, grainy,
 polished and patterned are also explored.
- Students have the opportunity to work in selective media for each project, from drawing in pencil, charcoal, graphite and ink to using dip pens, painting, batik, textiles, printmaking, ceramics, collages, 3D, posters and photography



Links with English and Maths

- Analysis and annotation of Artists and student's own work to describe feelings, intentions, processes and techniques using annotation guides and technical language in accordance with the curriculum
